The London Borough of Richmond upon Wandsworth

The London Borough of Richmond upon Thames – which includes the Twickenham side of the borough - is undergoing an enormous change of which many of us are not aware. Despite countless consultations about “Village Plans” the electorate has not been consulted about what now appears to be a marriage between LBRuT and Wandsworth Council called a “Shared Staffing Agreement”.

Wandsworth was not mentioned in the manifesto prior to the election of the current administration and after the election the Council did not consult residents about a “partnership” with Wandsworth Council. There was not a referendum but the Council went ahead - soon after the 2014 election -with plans which are resulting in significant changes to our borough. The Council has not arranged presentations about the changes – in fact many of us would hardly know it was happening – and it is too late.

We are consulted about our “villages” – many of which are towns - but nothing has been explained about the Wandsworth/LBRuT partnership and how it will affect the residents of the London Borough of Richmond upon Thames. What a dichotomy!

The situation is now starting to become apparent when we hear that experienced local staff have been lost and our queries are answered by officers in inner city Wandsworth.

“Highways” has become “Network Management” for the Councils of Richmond and Wandsworth. Some of our officers are now responsible for Wandsworth services as well as LBRuT after applying for new joint positions. For instance our former Head of Parks has now become Head of Culture for both boroughs and likewise Wandsworth officers are now controlling services in LBRuT.

It seems that some of our services such as Arts are undergoing a review and structural changes may be made. Wandsworth Council uses an organisation called “Enable” to manage its Arts and Leisure services: sports, arts and culture – just as our Parks department brought in the Event Umbrella company a number of years ago to manage and run events in LBRuT.



So, what happened to “We are listening” and Consultation? We have “Village” Plans but council administration is being centralised in a huge conglomerate. If anyone thinks this article is unfair consider this: Where are the information leaflets which should have been delivered to our doors? Where are the public meetings and presentations? When did we get to have our say? A grave omission for a listening Council.

PART 22 – ORLEANS HOUSE – A LOCAL TREASURE

A couple of modern postcards this week of the wonderful Octagon room at Orleans House. The first is a repro of a coloured lithograph by E.Pringet in 1844. It shows King Louise Phillipe of France visiting his old home at Orleans House, Twickenham.

This magnificent Palladian villa was built in 1710 for the politician and diplomat James Johnson. It was renamed as Orleans House by the then Duc D'Orleans, Louis Phillipe who lived there in the early 19th century prior to becoming the King of France.



80 years or so later by 1926 the house and parklands were mostly derelict although parts survived and the Octagon room itself was grade 1 listed in 1952. Other remaining parts of the building were converted into an art gallery in 1972 and formally opened by Prince Charles that year. Around this time much of the northern end of its former parkland were taken for the site of Orleans Park School. 2005 to 2008 saw the café and education centre established and in 2015 the gallery received £1.8 million from the Heritage Lottery Fund to restore the Octagon room and provide greater building access.



The second postcard shows the fabulous James Gibbs designed Octagon Room which was added to Orleans House in 1720 so it is almost 300 years old now. This postcard was issued by the RUT Libraries Department 25 years or so ago.

I was brought up in Orleans Road and in the 1950's the derelict grounds of the house were a wonderful playground for us kids to play hide and seek and cowboys and Indians etc. In 1972 my first wife and I took our own children to see the opening of the art gallery by the Prince of Wales and in 2003 my wife Astrid and I were married in the Octagon room itself. We have often attended exhibitions there since, including the very enjoyable history of Eel Pie Island's music scene a few years back.

So, great memories of a historic place that has in recent years successfully become a thriving and valuable part of Twickenham's history, an education centre, gallery and community hub. Well done to everyone concerned and long may it continue to be a focal point of Twickenham's riverside heritage.

It's National Vegetarian Week next week, and this is all about raising awareness and showcasing the ethical, health, and flavour factors of vegetarian eating. Even if you aren't a strict vegetarian, this recipe from Nicola Graimes, former editor of Vegetarian Living magazine, is easy and will be enjoyed by all the family. And there is some of our fabulous English seasonal asparagus at great prices locally at the moment.

EGG POTS WITH ASPARAGUS DIPPERS

A simple weekend brunch for friends or family, this recipe makes the most of the heat of the oven by roasting the asparagus at the same time as baking the eggs. It is also an easy dish to adapt to all tastes. The asparagus is perfect for dunking into the runny egg yolks.

Serves 4

Preparation time 10 minutes

Cooking time 17 minutes

200g/7oz baby leaf spinach, tough stalks removed

butter, for greasing

3 tbsp finely grated Parmesan cheese

4 large eggs

4 tbsp double/heavy cream

250g/9oz asparagus spears, ends trimmed

olive oil, for brushing

sea salt and freshly ground black pepper

toast fingers, to serve



Preheat the oven to 190°C/375°F/Gas 5. Steam the spinach for

2 minutes until wilted, then drain well and squeeze to remove any excess water. Roughly chop the spinach and leave to one side.

Meanwhile, liberally grease 4 large ramekins with butter and sprinkle the Parmesan over the base and up the sides of each one. Spoon the spinach into the ramekins and crack in an egg. Pour a tablespoonful of cream on top and season with salt and pepper. Bake for 12–15 minutes until the whites are set but the yolks remain runny.

Meanwhile, brush the asparagus with a little oil, put them in a roasting pan and roast for 10 minutes, turning once, until just tender. Serve the egg pots with the asparagus and fingers of toast by the side.

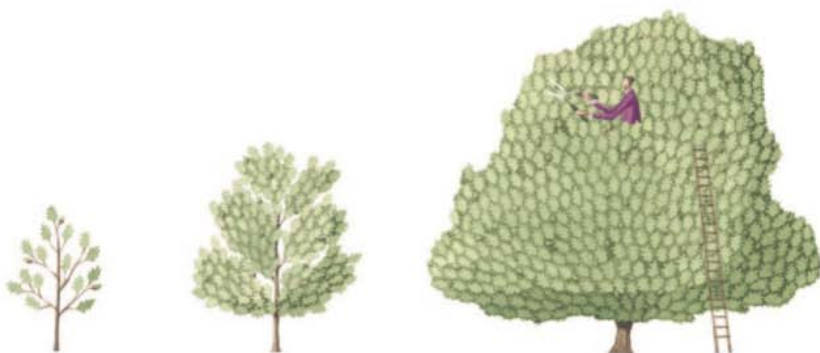

In the past, Orleans House, Twickenham has been depicted as an idyllic country retreat; worlds away from the hustle and bustle of the big city. A cool, flowing river within a pastoral setting, where horses and boats provide the main way in or out.



Working in collaboration, artists Beth Bronson and Laura Marker have responded to the visual history of Orleans House and Twickenham's riverside. By creating specifically filmed and photographed material, drawing upon characteristics from local historic documents, they have sought to incorporate elements such as colour and lighting, brush strokes and composition and key features such as horses, boats and the river.

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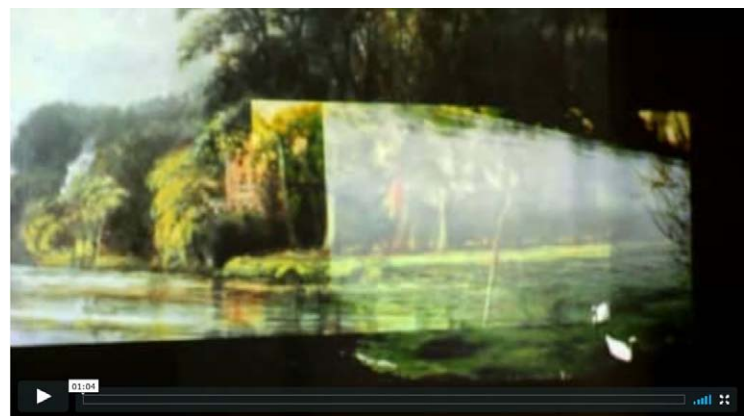
Working in collaboration, artists Beth Bronson

This material has been edited into low-tech moving-image animations inspired and informed by technologies that evolved during the eighteenth and nineteenth centuries such as "phantasmagoria" magic lantern shows, parlor amusements and the sequence images of Eadweard Muybridge.

This archival inspired artwork is projected directly onto the fabric of the historic stables building. The projections are installed in an immersive way allowing the viewer to step into the dreamscape world. The result will harken back to the late Eighteenth, early Nineteenth century and the heyday of Orleans House, giving the impression that a lost world has been momentarily recovered.

The honey bee 'swarming months' have begun

The honey bee 'swarming months' have begun. Many readers may have seen a swarm hanging from a tree branch but swarms can gather on just about anywhere – cars / lamp posts / sides of buildings and even shop windows – who remembers the swarm on the Top Shop window in Oxford Street which caused much excitement – and trepidation - amongst shoppers?! As Urban beekeepers, we have an obligation to try to prevent swarming or collect swarms as quickly as possible and thus minimise any nuisance they may cause.

As such beekeeping can at times be a very challenging hobby. One hive can very quickly become, two then three and so there is a fair amount of management to be done particularly during April – July which is the peak swarming time.

Honey bees swarm because there is congestion in the hive and they need more space and also as a natural method of reproduction, when the Queen is old (3-5 years) and laying less eggs. The colony splits in two – or sometimes continues to split until you have hardly any bees left. The first main swarm is known as a Prime Swarm and subsequent smaller swarms are known as Castes. Swarms can also be triggered by lack of space in the hive, so beekeepers need to make weekly and careful inspections of their bees during this period, adding more frames and boxes is necessary to ensure they have enough space (a Queen can lay up to 2,000 eggs in a day) and to also check if the bees are creating 'Queen Cells' to raise new Queens. If this happens, some form of "artificial swarm" must be done, which basically tricks the bees into thinking they have swarmed. This will result in another hive (although the two can be combined at a later date and the old Queen dispatched (freezing is the kindest way).



If a Queens Cell is missed during an inspection and thus allowed to grow, a swarm will be issued on the first dry warm day after the Queen Cell is capped.

When in 'swarm mode' the Queen and most of the flying bees will initially fly out in a huge mass and settle nearby, whilst 'scout' bees go off in search of a new home. This process can take several hours. Members of the public should ring their local apiary to report a swarm and a "swarm alert" is sent out to beekeepers and the swarm is allocated to and collected by the first beekeeper to respond. Once the 'scout's bees have found somewhere, they indicate to the hanging bees, encouraging others to do the same. Once a consensus is reached, the bees will take off. Beekeepers therefore have to act quickly once a swarm is reported.

This photograph shows a large 'prime' swarm that I collected from a garden in Twickenham last year.

Not every report of bee swarms turn out to be honey bees though and often a cluster of bees in a garden is found to be a bumble bee nest in an empty bird box. More information about this can be found here: www.bumblebeeconservation.org/about-bees/habitats/bumblebee-nests

Fracked!

I have recently been researching my family tree.

Apparently I come from agricultural stock; the

ladies of my family until the middle of the 19th century were straw plaiters in Biggleswade.

When free trade was introduced in the 1860's and the English market was undercut by cheaper imports from Italy the trade died off and my ancestors were forced to relocate closer to London to seek their fortune. So imagine the chord that Fracked! struck with me when only ten minutes into this most relevant of satires there was mention of more jobs for village locals if no one minded the environmental impact; and that the unscrupulous PR team determined to get the fracking show on the road was named "Moxley Biggleswade". That could be a coincidence, but Alastair Beaton's extremely funny and thought-provoking script didn't seem to allow for coincidence. The research that has gone into this well-crafted play is evident throughout, as is Beaton's obvious desire to try to see all sides of this contentious subject by creating in Hal, the head of Deerland Energy an amiable soul who doesn't like bad language and is motivated by the altruistic desire to "keep the lights on".

As one would expect from an author steeped in the tradition of Spitting Image, the play has not been allowed to rest on its current affairs laurels since it was first shown last year. There was a laugh out loud moment at the expense of Diane Abbott and much resigned chuckling from the Richmond audience in recognition of the "strong and stable" slogan.

Although the opening of the play is somewhat Ayckbournesque with stock parish council types being caught unawares by an unlikely protester it quickly becomes a clarion call for the protest movement. The audience is never lectured, but is continuously informed of environmental facts that are quite shocking (just look up the carbon emission of an AGA) and drip-fed the rather frightening truth of the erosion of the democratic process through the infiltration of both academic establishments and corridors of power by big business. This is all done in such an entertaining way that at times people were, I'm sure, laughing through tears of frustration.

James Cotterill has designed a truly impressive set that is stylish and does exactly what it is supposed to. The action moves very smoothly between the clinical PR office and the cosiest of cosy country kitchens. The irony of this kitchen - home to environmental activists - was not lost: the above mentioned AGA was in situ (!)

Improvements at Teddington Memorial Hospital welcomed by Vince Cable, but why the cuts in beds?

Vince Cable, the Liberal Democrat Parliamentary candidate for Twickenham, has warmly welcomed the improvements in care services set out in a recent report by the Care Quality Commission, the findings included:

- Regular oversight of the inpatient unit by members of the Executive team.
- All day shifts were filled by 100% permanent staff. Night shifts by 95% permanent staff.
- The inpatient environment was visibly clean, quiet and calm.
- CQC inspectors' visits were unannounced and they found patients were up and dressed early in the day.
- Staff had received additional training in areas that had been identified as weak at the previous inspection.
- All healthcare assistants had obtained the care certificate.
- Inspectors found no issues associated with privacy and dignity. Staff sought patients' consent for treatment including daily activities such as washing and dressing.
- There was resuscitation equipment on the inpatient unit which had not been readily available on the previous inspection, and staff were confident in how to use it.



Vince Cable, who played a major role in saving the Teddington Memorial Hospital from closure when he was the MP, commented on the latest report:

“I very much welcome these important improvements in care services. A huge thank you and praise should go to all the staff at Teddington Memorial Hospital.

“However, while welcoming these improvements I am simply astounded that the current Government policy is

to cut beds. The Teddington Memorial Hospital's care services for frail, elderly people could play a much bigger role in helping to reduce demand on acute services at acute hospitals such as Kingston and West Middlesex.

“It is a false economy and simply counter productive to be reducing beds at the Teddington Memorial Hospital.”

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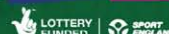

Compost giveaway marked national week

Over seven tonnes of compost was given away to residents this weekend, marking the start of International Compost Awareness Week.

Yesterday, 328 residents from across the borough collected up to twenty litres of compost as part of a free giveaway with the Council's waste and recycling team, Veolia (waste and recycling collection contractor) and the West London Waste Authority.

West Twickenham Controlled Parking Zone - Have your say

Residents in West Twickenham can have their say on a Council consultation which proposes to introduce a new controlled parking zone (CPZ).

In July-September 2016, Richmond Council invited feedback from the community about parking in the Twickenham Green area.

The Council considered all responses and has decided to move to the next phase of consultation. Roads that are being considered as part of this process include; Gould Road, Gravel Road, May Road, Crane Road, Norcutt Road, Warwick Road, Hamilton Road, Talbot Road and Marsh Farm Road. Roads surrounding this area are also being asked if they would want to join the new parking zone if it is implemented.

The concerns from residents regarding current parking availability includes: daytime commuter traffic and non-residential parking that can result in a lack of available parking spaces for the community. In addition, residents are concerned about the impact that nearby developments might have on the local area.

The purpose of the consultation is to confirm whether there is over 50% support for the CPZ from households in the proposed area. The closing date for the consultation is Friday 23 June 2017.

Nick O'Donnell, Richmond Council's Assistant Director for Traffic and Engineering, said: "Generally the Council expects positive support from over 50 per cent of households before implementing a new CPZ or extending an existing CPZ. Your views are therefore vital to shaping the Council's final decision and it is important that as many people as possible have their say. "There are different underlying causes for the parking problems across the area and we will be carefully evaluating the results of this consultation. If there is sufficient positive support the Council will proceed to advertise (traffic management orders) formally proposing to implement the CPZ"

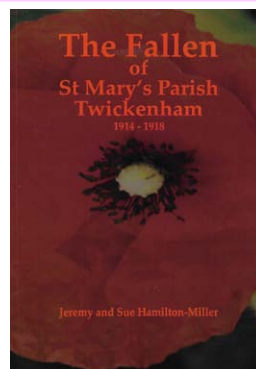
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
